

# We Have a Living Prophet

Teach your child about who our prophet is and why we are blessed to have him in our lives!

## Purpose

To help each child understand that we are blessed when we follow the prophet.

## Preparation

Mark Scriptures ~ 1 Samuel 3:10

Find Pictures of ~ Boy Samuel Called by the Lord, Thomas S Monson

# We Have a Living Prophet

**Opening Song** ~ Follow the Prophet (Primary Hymnbook; Hymn 110)

**Opening Prayer**

**Attention Activity** ~ Display a picture of Thomas S Monson, and ask your child if they know who he is. If they do great! If not, what a great teaching opportunity, make sure to note your love and trust towards the prophet.

**Scripture** ~ 1 Samuel 3:10

Have the child repeat, word for word the scripture. Explain how Samuel was “a servant” to the Lord. Explain that is what a prophet is, someone who serves and helps the Lord.

**Scripture Story** ~ Samuel the Boy Prophet

Tell your child the story of Samuel the Boy prophet in 1 Samuel 3:1-10, 19-20

Talking points: how we can say, Here am I, just like Samuel did. Talk about how Samuel was young, most prophets are older. Talk about how a prophet is a servant of the Lord.

**Story** ~ “Heavenly Father’s Helpers” ~ From October 2008 Friend (Link on Family Night Website)

Show your child the video of Heavenly Father’s Helpers. Talk about how Bailey helps Heavenly Father just like the prophet helps Heavenly Father – and we can too even though we are not prophets.

**Activity** ~ Don’t Eat the Prophet Game!

A game found on sugardoodle.net. You print out pictures of all the prophets and set a piece of cereal on each one. A person goes out of the room and the others decide which prophet to choose. After you decide the person outside the room comes back and everyone starts singing a prophet song. One by one the person who came back in eats a piece of cereal off the prophets. Once you get to the prophet you agreed on everyone shouts, “Don’t eat the prophet!” and a new person leaves the room. I would suggest having mom or dad or an older sibling go first, so they are not too surprised by everyone shouting don’t eat the prophet!

**Testimony** ~ Bear your testimony to your child about how thankful you are that we have a living prophet today. It doesn’t need to be eloquent and long, just keep it simple and heartfelt!

Closing Song ~ Latter Day Prophets (Primary Hymnbook; Hymn 134)

Closing Prayer

Treat ~ Suggested Treat ~ Orange Sherbet (rumored to be President Monson's Favorite treat)

### Extra Activities for This Lesson ~

1 ~ Last General Conference.

Listen to a talk the prophet gave at the last general conference. Talk about what the prophet did and explain that is exactly what Heavenly wants us to hear. Make a goal of something you and your family could work on!

2 ~ Prophet matching game.

Print off two copies of pictures of the prophets and make a memory game out of it! See if you can remember all the names as you play!

3 ~ Learn the song "We Thank Thee, O God, for a Prophet." When I was younger my dad told me I would never know when I would be in the presence of the prophet and I should always know this song just in case. For some reason this always stuck out to me and now I know the song by heart just in case!
